



## **SilVHER Asset Mapping Data Summary (April 2008)**

---

This summary is based on a voluntary survey of 52 college preparation, access, and transfer programs in eight colleges in the Silicon Valley region. Data were collected from February through April 2008. All data were self-reported by program staff. We estimate that these 52 programs represent approximately 70-80 percent of the total amount of college access services implemented by SilVHER institutions.

### Limitations and notes:

The following data summary is a representation of individual programs and the types of services they provide to students at specific schools. These data do not reveal the depth, capacity, or outcomes of the services provided nor how many students are reached by these services. For this data summary, some elements of data were consolidated or reclassified into new or different categories to simplify the data tabulation. The reports found on the SilVHER Asset Mapping Web site reflect the original data reported by program staff.

### **Key Findings**

- The majority of programs that submitted data provide college preparation and access services to high schools (52%). Two-year colleges are the second most common type of school served (37%).
- Six percent of programs provide any services to middle or elementary schools.
- East Side Union High School District receives services from the greatest number of providers. Independence and Yerba Buena High School students were listed most frequently as service recipients (both schools are reached by 14 different programs).
- Sixty-eight percent of the programs that submitted data provide services to current college students.
- Sixty-two percent of programs serve pre-transfer college students and 36 percent serve post-transfer college students.
- Fifty-eight percent of programs directly serve high school students, and 48 percent of programs have a parent outreach component.
- High school students, especially in East Side Union High School District, tend to receive more services in the areas of college applications and admissions support, the financial aid process, college/career exploration, campus visits, and parent outreach.
- Twenty-three of the 52 programs, or 44 percent, currently offer some form of transfer support.
- Forty-two of the 52 programs provide support for college knowledge, mainly to high school students, in the form of helping with the application and admission process, campus visits, or college and career exploration services.

- The most common services provided to students in East Side Union High School District and San Jose Unified School District involve support with the college application and admission process and the financial aid process.
- Parent outreach to San Jose Unified School District represents 7 percent of all program activities in the district as opposed to 12 percent of the activities in East Side Union High School District.
- As a result of this preliminary analysis, we recommend further data collection to complete the asset mapping database.

## I. Institutions Represented

The asset mapping database contains 52 college preparation, access, and transfer outreach programs implemented by eight colleges across the greater Silicon Valley region. Within the database there are 1,301 unique records that describe each instance of a program, which provides a specific service to a K-12 school, district, or college.

## II. Institutions and Populations That Receive Services

Table 2 includes the types of schools or institutions that receive services from the 52 programs and Table 3 outlines the individual schools most served by the various programs.

Table 4 describes the various populations served by the 52 programs. Most of the programs provide services to pre-transfer college students and high school students. The least served populations are middle school students (17 percent) and elementary school students (10 percent). Nearly half of all programs conduct some form of parent outreach.

### III. Services Provided

Within the asset mapping database, the services reported by each program have been consolidated into 13 categories. Each service type occurs in at least 10 percent of the programs. As shown in Table 5a, assistance with college applications and the admissions process is the most common type of service reported, followed by assistance with the financial aid process. Table 5b outlines the services that are provided by the fewest number of programs, including test preparation, non-academic support, and summer programs.

Table 6 outlines the number of instances in which a specific type of school or district is provided with a specific type of service. These numbers represent the number of service *connections* between program services and the schools or districts where the services are offered. There are 1,301 total service connections reported by the 52 programs. Most services support high school students, with East Side Union High School District receiving the largest share. Two-year colleges tend to receive more services, such as transfer support, college and career exploration and advising, and campus visits. High school students, especially in ESUHSD, tend to receive more services in the areas of college applications and admissions support, the financial aid process, college/career exploration, campus visits and parent outreach.
